#### TOITŪ OTAGO SETTLERS MUSEUM ACTIVITY REPORT

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

1 This report covers activities of Toitū Otago Settlers Museum (Toitū) from 1 July to 30 September 2025.

#### **BACKGROUND**

This report is prepared for the Toitū Otago Settlers Museum Board meeting and details the latest activities and KPI performance at Toitū.


#### **DISCUSSION**

#### **Visitation**

Toitū recorded 52,475 visitors this quarter, representing a 20% decrease compared with the same period in FY 24/25. Although this is unfavourable to the same period in the previous year, the September visitation was higher than previous year and indicates a positive upward trend as we move out of winter, and we prepare for the high summer cruise ship season.

#### **COLLECTIONS AND EXHIBITIONS**

#### **Exhibitions**

#### New displays

- The CRAFT is a new temporary display in the Transport and Technology gallery, about freemasonry in Dunedin. The display features recently donated items to the Museum, including a pair of stunning plaster columns from Lodge Maori, as well as an array of masonry 'jewels'. The museum hosted a morning tea for the freemasonry community to mark the opening on 12<sup>th</sup> September.
- DANCE!, a new display in the Creative Dunedin opened this reporting period. It tells the story of Shona Dunlop MacTavish MBE (1920-2019) dancer, teacher, choreographer and pioneer of liturgical dance, often referred to as 'the mother of modern dance in New Zealand'. The exhibition includes dance costumes, live dance footage and a mirror wall and interactive ballet barre for practising some of Shona's signature dance moves.
- The team completed an object changeover and construction of a façade to our small display 1925-26 SHOW TIME which commemorates the 1925-1926 New Zealand and South Seas International Exhibition which ran from 17 November 1925 to 1 May 2026 attracting more than 3 million visits. Work also started on a project to restore the 1925 pinstriping to Josephine who was saved from potential scrapping and spruced up for this exhibition.
- 7 Eden in Dunedin: Highlights from the Eden Hore Central Otago Fashion collection continues in the Material Culture gallery. This exhibition continues to be very popular, along with the publication Central Otago Couture: The Eden Hore Collection, which is now on its second print run. Taking into account its popularity and the resource needed to create a new exhibit in this space at a time of reduced staffing, the team are working with the Eden Hore Central Otago Trust to look at running the exhibition for another year into early 2028 —with the addition of a new suite of costume.



The team have completed several smaller changeouts to permanent displays including an update to the Radio display in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century gallery, and preparatory work for an update to GOLD and Call to Arms.

## Maintenance of permanent exhibits

- 9 The Exhibitions and collections team continuously maintain the quality of the permanent exhibits at Toitū, this work includes the following:
- Audio Visual (AV) touchscreens: Earlier this year the digital label rail screens were replaced for the majority of displays and the team is now working on needed replacements to data projectors and larger screens across the Museum, in accordance with our replacement schedule.
- Lighting renewals: In early 2025 the technical team began to roll out new light fittings in the permanent displays. However a fault was discovered requiring the consignment to be returned to Germany for correction. The repaired units are expected back on site in December ready for a continuation of the update in early 2026.

#### Permanent exhibition updates

- Staff continue to make progress on the Portrait database, creating a single, authoritative catalogue for the entire portrait collection at Toitū. The outcome will be a new, searchable online database, along with updated content in the Smith Gallery, including full biographies for all portraits on display and the inclusion of many of the JTNE 100 series films.
- Foyer Immersive Project update: On 8 July, following completion of an extensive procurement process, content development commenced with a two day hui with mana whenua. We are now building the content working as co-creators with mana whenua, which includes monthly reporting through to the mana whenua panel. Process is a little slower than expected and the delivery date has pushed into early 2026 at this stage.

#### Collections

#### Acquisitions

During this reporting period 18 new collection items were accepted into the collection. Highlights include a fourth (previously unknown) sketchbook by John Buchanan (1819-1898) Botanist and Artist, which joins three sketchbooks already held in our collection and which are iconic containing valuable early sketches of NZ landscape and flora. A large number of garments from the Nom D archive, and featured in the Dunedin Public Art Gallery exhibition *This is NomD!* were purchased for the costume / creative Dunedin collection.

## Collections support of exhibitions

19 A new registrar has been recruited and will commence duties in the New Year. We are very pleased to welcome Anne Harlow from Tūhura Museum to the team. Anne brings a wealth of experience across collections including detailed knowledge of our collection database Vernon. In the interim we have continue to support exhibition, acquisitions and collections enquiries by working across the collections and exhibitions team to cover gaps. We have been very lucky to continue with our long serving conservator Fiona McLaughlan who has been able to cover a lot of ground in relation to acquisitions and exhibition preparation.

#### Collections projects

Asbestos Remediation: The team continues to test and remediate specific objects from two stores (two of the four have been remediated and declared safe) when they are required for retrieval for access or display. Work continues with the DCC Property team on the offsite store at Parry Street, as time and current resource levels allow, to enable work to remediate the building itself which is asbestos contaminated, before moving into object testing.

## Conservations projects

- 21 Conservation work this reporting period includes:
  - 123 objects through the lab donations/loans/exhibition related.
  - Development of object sampling procedure and process to enable investigation into type of bone used in accessioned masonic tracing board pointer.



#### **Archives**

Collections and Exhibitions staff processed 37 public enquiries. The majority of these were collection based. The reporting does not reflect the time spent on an enquiry – some can take several hours to complete. The team is currently sharing these across three staff – the Manager and two curators.

#### **AUDIENCE DEVELOPMENT**

#### **Enriching Local Curriculum (ELC) – Education**

Education themes explored through the Enriching Local Curriculum (ELC) programme across this reporting period for early childhood, primary and secondary ākonga included drama inspired by early Dunedin stories, a high school history class looking at displays and interpretation within the museum to use as background information for creating their own mini-exhibitions back at school, highlights tours with interactive learning activities along the way for primary aged ākonga, education outreach themed around toys, Exploring Our Wai (water) with a focus on water and how Māori and Europeans used the water resources and wildlife associated with it, play time for one year olds in the NZR Foyer play area, transportation, an interactive general museum discovery session incorporating music, songs and games for early childhood ākonga, general museum exploration, and self-guided ākonga led visits.

#### **Visitor Programmes**

- During this reporting period, our program of public talks featured a variety of speakers. These included heritage restorer Peter Mackenzie, speaking about his stained-glass window and masonry work in Otago, Seán Brosnahan, Toitū Curator and Will McKee, Toitū Exhibitions Developer, speaking about the experience of creating Journey to New Edinburgh, and Visitor Programmes Coordinator Chris Watts speaking on his recent visit to the NZ Liberation Museum in Le Quesnoy, France.
- The school holiday offerings included a Pinewood Derby workshop where children built and decorated a toy race car inspired by the vehicles in Toitū's galleries, decorating small envelopes for holding seeds, as part of a wider programme focused on food sustainability, and a gallery trail themed around the journey from black and white, into colour. Regular school holiday cake decorating workshop leader Jess, led experiences for all ages themed around 'technicolour' and Candyland. Toitū, Dunedin Public Art Gallery, and Dunedin public Libraries collaborated on a Matariki themed star trail for children in celebration of Puaka Matariki.
- Toitū facilitated a new relationship with Our Food Network, and collaborated on a day of family friendly activities teaching visitors about food sustainability and a talk series on the history of food production in the region.

#### **COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY**

#### Retail

- 27 Retail performance at Toitū remained strong over the reporting period, with all three months showing year-on-year growth:
- Activity in the first quarter centred on product development, restocking, and forward purchasing for the next six months. Attendance at the Auckland Gift Fair in late August enabled the



Commercial Manager to review current market trends, strengthen supplier relationships, and secure new stock for the upcoming peak season.

- The Tiger Tea Bus T-shirt was refreshed with new seasonal colours for both adults and children and continues to perform well. Additionally, a bespoke Josephine model kitset was developed with NZ company Abstract Designs, undergoing multiple design iterations before release. The product has been well received across a broad visitor demographic.
- A suite of printed products commemorating the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Dunedin and South Seas Exhibition was also completed.
- We remain committed to supporting Dunedin and Otago artists and brands, actively expanding our locally sourced product range through the continual addition of new lines.
- Preparations for the Christmas programme are progressing as planned. Santa photography, alongside Pixie Town and other festive activities, is expected to drive strong visitation and retail performance. December consistently delivers the highest retail revenue of the year.

#### **Functions and Commercial Events**

- A total of 28 private venue bookings were held at Toitū between 1 July and 30 September 2025, compared with 12 bookings for the same period in 2024, representing substantial growth in this area.
- 34 Sam Willis has now assumed responsibility for all function bookings across the Dunedin Public Art Gallery, Toitū Otago Settlers Museum, and the Lan Yuan Dunedin Chinese Garden. He is supported by Henry Deaker, Functions and Retail Assistant, who works across all three sites.
